+ CANTICLE OF ZECHARIAH

+ COMMEMORATION: POLYCARP

Outside of the account of the death of Stephen (Acts 7), the story of the martyrdom of Polycarp is the oldest such story extant. Polycarp belongs to the so-called sub-apostolic age: in his youth he had heard the preaching of an apostle, in his case an apostle named John (some have presumed this John to have been the Beloved Disciple, others are less certain). Thus Polycarp belongs to the first generation following the death of the apostles. Polycarp also knew Ignatius, another witness to the apostolic age; the Antiochene bishop and martyr addressed a short letter to him. Polycarp may even have been responsible for collecting (and thus preserving) Ignatius' letters.

Polycarp is best known, however, for the account of his martyrdom. In it, we find the central motif which motivated later women and men to give their lives for their faith in

Christ: dying in a death like Christ's as the highest form of discipleship. Certainly, Ignatius said something similar earlier (see October 17). The difference, however, lies in the fact that the Martyrdom of Polycarp strives to show that in all things Polycarp's death was parallel to the account of Christ's passion, or "conformable to the gospel" (chapter 1). Thus the story of Polycarp's death served as a model for future narratives of the death of Christian martyrs. The Martyrdom also includes a number of polemical features of which the modern reader must be aware, including a strong hint of anti-Judaism (e.g., the Jews of Smyrna urge the Romans to arrest Polycarp), a common feature in early Christian writing.

Particularly striking is Polycarp's prayer of self-offering before he is burned at the stake. Its form and content, many authors believe, may have been very like the prayer he prayed each Sunday at his church's eucharist:

Lord, almighty God, through whom we have come to the knowledge of yourself, God of angels, of powers, of all creation, of all the race of saints who live in your sight, I bless you for judging me worthy of this day, this hour, so that in the company of the martyrs I

may share the cup of Christ, your anointed one, and so rise again to eternal life in soul and body, immortal through the power of the Holy Spirit.
