+ CANTICLE OF ZECHARIAH

We bless you, Adonai, <u>God</u> of *Israel*, for you come to visit us and ransom <u>us</u> from *bondage*.

+ THE APOSTLE'S CREED

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth. And in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and sits at the right hand of the Father Almighty. + COMMEMORATION: DAVID OF WALES

Though we know him to have been a real person, little is known of David, even the dates of his birth and death – sometime during the first or sixth centuries – remain a guess. He was the son of King Xantus, a prince of Cardigan in far western Wales; the rest of his biography is unreliable, having been written in the eleventh century by Rhygyfarch in an attempt to uphold the claim of the Welsh bishopric independent of Canterbury. David first appeared in an Irish Catalogue of Saints around 730; by 800, his feast day was set as March 1st.

Legend says that St Patrick stayed for a time in Wales late in his life, intending to remain there. He was sent a vision of angels who told him that he was to return to Ireland "while Wales waited for the saint whom God should send."

David is said to have become a priest, studying under Saint Paulinus for several years on an unidentified island. Working as a missionary, he founded several monasteries, at least one of which was known for its extreme asceticism, its Rule being based on those of the Egyptian monks. Allowing one meal a day, frequent fasts and great lengths of silence, David was said to set an even stricter Rule for himself, drinking only water and praying alone long after vespers.

Even within these guidelines, David and his monks were said to be cheerful and happy, enjoying music and their work of copying scripture.

A persuasive preacher, David was named Archbishop of Wales sometime around 550, though quite unwillingly. Following his acceptance, a white dove was said to have landed on his shoulders as if it were a sign of God's grace and blessing.

David is said to have convened the Synod of Victory (so called because it marked the end of Pelagianism) and to have written regulations for the British Church.

In art, St. David is depicted as a Celtic bishop with long hair and a beard, and a dove perched on his shoulder. He may be shown preaching on a hill, or holding his cathedral.
